- Convergence of issues rooted in Colonialism
  - Slavery: a by-product of colonialism
  - Revolutionary independence movements
    - Aimed at overthrow of colonial rulers
    - Usually correlated with Communism

- LBJ and limits of power: How much change?
  - Communism: Invest Presidential prestige in changing views about communism and communists, as Kennedy argued in his speech at American University shortly before the assassination?
    - Revolutionary independence movements: Viewed as a component of communist conspiracy.
  - Slavery: Use Kennedy martyrdom to attain passage of meaningful Civil Rights legislation?
  - Pick One: Communism or Slavery

- LBJ selects Civil Rights
  - Carve his place in history
  - Interested in domestic affairs
  - Stepping stone for launching Great Society
  - Meeting with James Farmer
    - Kultur International Films (2005) The LBJ tapes: the Johnson White House tapes. Volume 4., Chapter 8.

- The price for focusing on Civil Rights and domestic issues.
  - Continuation and expansion of U.S. involvement in Vietnam with no way out
  - Perpetuating the notion of the domino theory
  - Fighting a war he believed unwinnable and unnecessary
  - Wished Vietnamese would accept a Korea solution, or simply just go way so he could focus on the things he enjoyed

  - Colonel A. Peter Dewey, September, 1945
  - General Matthew Ridgeway report for Eisenhower
  - Views of Senators Richard Russell and Mike Mansfield
  - Intelligence reports
  - LBJ's instinct

- So why fight in Vietnam?
  - Fear of Soft on Communism label
  - Opposition could use this label to derail his domestic agenda, most specifically Civil Rights
  - Evidence the passion to win Civil Rights encapsulated in Voting Rights speech of March 16, 1965
